Sustainable systems depend on clearly defined roles, regular assessment cycles, meaningful data analysis, and effective communication of results. How do you build the structures and accountability that turn plans into institutional practice?

Academic program review evaluates program quality, effectiveness, and alignment with institutional mission. While annual assessment tracks specific learning outcomes, program review takes a broader, periodic look at performance to identify strengths, guide improvement, and inform planning and resource allocation. What components make a review process effective and strengthen academic programs?

Goal: Design a systematic academic program review process (Standard 7: EE 6).

- ▶ Use program review findings to support planning, resource allocation, and improvement
